The Abram Communities Together Neighbourhood Plan 2018

Introduction:

The Abram Neighbourhood Forum is a group of residents and stakeholders living within the Abram ward, with representatives from all five villages. The group have been developing the Abram Together Neighbourhood Plan for several years.

Key themes have been identified for the Neighbourhood Plan, specifically; economic development, housing and open spaces. There is an aspiration to maximise the use of significant assets including buildings and green space to increase the economic and environmental benefit of these for the communities in the Abram ward.

Power to Change funding has been secured, which is a significant boost and recognition of the excellent work that has been undertaken and the intended approach for going forward. This funding has a specific focus on supporting growth of community businesses.

As part of the development of the Neighbourhood Plan, PLACED were commissioned to engage local people in the emerging plan, raise awareness of the process and engage residents with the identified themes. In line with work undertaken to date, the key themes for engagement were agreed as:

- Local green spaces
- Local business hubs and economic ventures
- Local housing needs





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The Approach

PLACED delivered five public engagement events, one in each of the villages in the Abram ward. Locations were chosen in collaboration with the Abram Neighbourhood Forum, with spaces identified as having potential for passing trade and being easily visible. The events were based from a Campervan, Ed, along with a gazeebo, encouraging people to stop and talk with the team.

The dates for the events were:

- 9th May: Platt Bridge (30 people)
- 16th May in Abram (16 people)
- 18th May in Bamfurlong (36 people)
- 23rd May in Bickershaw (23 people)
- 24th May in Springview (32 people)

In total around 136 people were engaged.

All five events provided an informal, accessible and visual approach for the residents to share their views on the Abram ward. The questions centred on the key themes mentioned above.

 Local green spaces: Questions focused on current use of local green spaces and what improvements would encourage greater use. A focus was given to the 12 key areas identified in the Abram Neighbourhood Plan

- Local business hubs and economic ventures: Activity explored what the local community felt would benefit the area from an economic perspective, including businesses and neighbourhood hubs
- Local housing needs: Activity focused on what type and size (number of bedrooms) of housing residents felt would be of greatest benefit to the Abram ward.

Questions were presented as a series of visual activity boards, including overarching information about the project, the use of precedent images to enable participants to envisage potential areas of opportunity, and maps of the area. Questions were designed to encourage participants to consider the whole ward and reflect on the close proximity of the villages to one another.

Event delivery

A large network of ambassadors, including professionals working in the industry and university students, supports PLACED events. This voluntary work brings in-kind support and added value to the work PLACED facilitates, with our volunteers drawing on their significant knowledge, expertise and experience.

Across the Abram events, six PLACED ambassadors and one Student Ambassador provided significant additional knowledge and experience, along with an in-kind value equivalent to £1,975.00.



Summary of Findings

Question 1: Have you heard of the Abram Neighbourhood Forum? Have you heard of the Abram Communities Together Neighbourhood Plan?

This activity was designed to establish the number of residents who have an existing awareness of the Abram Neighbourhood Forum and the Abram Communities Together Neighbourhood Plan. Participants placed a sticker in the relevant box to indicate either 'yes' or 'no' to each of the questions.



Question 1 findings

Bickershaw and Bamfurlong had the highest percentage of residents with an awareness of the Abram Neighbourhood Forum and the Abram Neighbourhood Plan. This may be in part due to efforts of members of the Forum in these two areas to encourage residents to come and speak with us on the day, leading to a higher percentage of participants having heard of the Forum and Plan through these representatives.

Whilst these were the only areas in which more people responded 'yes' than 'no', overall there was a reasonable awareness of both the Forum and the Plan.

Question 2: What size and type of homes are needed in Abram?

This activity was intended to understand residents' views on housing; specifically, what size and type of homes are needed in the Abram Ward.

The Activity comprised of two parts; Question 2a focused on the number of bedrooms that any new properties should have and Question 2b focused on the type of housing. A series of choices were provided for each question. Participants indicated their choice by placing a sticker in each relevant answer box, and could select multiple options.

Alongside the boxes, participants could use post-it notes to indicate a response which was not listed e.g. 'Enough housing', or an additional comment.

The tables below indicate the combined responses from all five events.

Comments were collated from each area, and included:

Platt Bridge

- One bed apartments to support homelessness issues
- Two bed bungalow so that carers can live there too
- More housing with adaptations for those with additional needs/elderly
- Want to live on estate with other older people not families
- Can't get 2 bed housing close to school now need to walk further
- Reuse existing housing stock
- Want green spaces within housing developments

Abram

- The green spaces are what makes Wigan special and different
- Don't need more housing
- Losing greenspaces to housing. The roads / infrastructure can't manage it
- Housing being built on green spaces don't need more!
- Houses that have been empty and run down for years.

Bamfurlong

- It's more about who is living in the houses - not the size etc. Recent accommodation built now have drug users in

Bickershaw

- Bungalows for older people gives more freedom
- Want more housing for children and grandchildren

Springview

- Don't see an immediate need
- None

Question 2 findings

Residents expressed a preference for housing for families, indicated by the highest choice being for three bed, semi-detached properties.

However, a significant proportion of people thought that there was enough housing with concerns over inadequate infrastructure for more housing, congestion management and loss of vital green spaces. This was a particular theme in Abram.

Additional comments were also received regarding the provision of housing suitable for an ageing population, with the 'Bungalow' option being the second most popular housing type.

It is worth noting that this activity was not as well engaged with as others. This could be because people found it more difficult to specify what they feel is required in terms of housing provision.

Question 3: What would support the local economy?

This activity looks to stimulate discussion and encourage people to consider what ideas would best support the local economy. Participants were also asked, wherever possible, to indicate where they felt these ideas could be realised.

19 precedent images representing a diverse range of ideas was displayed. Participants indicated which ideas

they felt were a priority for the area by placing a sticker in the adjoining space, with scope to choose up to 5 ideas. Alongside the boxes, participants were encouraged to use post-it notes to elaborate on their choices.

The table below shows the combined number of votes for each intervention from all sessions.

The information broken down by village can be found in the appendix. Whilst there were many similarities, there were some variations in priorities between areas.

There disparity in the ideas within the individual villages may be due to personal situations, such as those with relationships to young people or those with specialised health needs, i.e. older people or those with disabilities, along with the differences of facilities in the different areas.

Other Comments

A wide range of additional comments and ideas were received. These have been broken down into the categories below. Key for many was addressing the lack of opportunity for young people, with some feeling there was a lack of facilities for young people of all ages.

Question 3 findings

Overall, community cafes received the largest number of votes. Some participants felt there is an absence of diverse food options, in particular those suitable for children of an evening. The social aspect of cafes was key, reflecting the demise of the local pub / social club which provided a meeting point in the past. Community cafes ranked particularly highly in Bamfurlong, where it was the top priority. Independent food stores were also ranked highly, in particular in Springview and Bickershaw.

Community Hubs and Community Clubs combined saw a significant proportion of votes, with Community Hubs being the priority in Platt Bridge. People identified activity for a wide range of age groups that could be delivered in centres. The centre in Abram was specifically identified by local people as having potential to grow and engage with more people.

Springview residents indicate chain retail / food shops are a priority, but every other village showed little demand for these. Rather, other areas ranked markets, pop-up shops and independent business much higher.

Abram saw Skills and Training, along with Social Enterprise as a priority, both also also ranked highly in Platt Bridge and Bickershaw.

Smart Tech, Co-working spaces and Community startups were not a priority in any area.

There was a strong interest in social spaces, such as entertainment and opportunities to enjoy live music and to socialise during the evenings and weekends. Many also felt that these types of interventions would make the areas more attractive to younger audiences and tourists.

A breakdown of priorities by village can be provided in Appendix 1.






Question 4a: How we use our green spaces now?

This activity used a map to highlight twelve green spaces across the Abram ward, with five specified activities in which residents might use these spaces for. There was an 'other' category which they could highlight activities which were not specified or did not fit within the prescribed list. Participants used a sticker to indicate which green spaces they use today, and what they use the space for.

How do we use our green spaces now?



Question 4a findings

The most common activities highlighted were exercise / sport, dog walking and taking children to the greenspaces. The most commonly used green space was Amberswood Common. Low Hall Park, Ince Moss, Maypole Wood and Victoria Fields, were the next most used greenspaces. Generally, these areas were used mainly for the above-mentioned activities.

Participants could give additional comments, which highlighted specific areas in which residents enjoy regularly. These included positive comments on the following additional areas:

- Polly's Pond: A good asset for families. However, respondents feel it needs to be made more visible and reduce vandalism to encourage more use
- Cycling paths: Generally, well utilised for exercise but also for walking and commuting between the villages
- The canal: This is a popular green space across all the villages. Participants commented that it is heavily utilised and feels safe and of great value to the Abram ward, particularly those in Abram and Bickershaw
- Fishing ponds / rivers: Some residents in Abram and Bickershaw commented on the use of these types of spaces had reduced as they have not been managed, and would be key green spaces if restored.



Question 4b: How we could improve our green spaces?

The second part of this question was designed to encourage participants to consider what interventions or improvements to existing spaces would have the greatest benefit, and where these should happen. This was intended to encourage them to consider the whole ward rather than focusing only on their own village.

A series of images and image titles were provided, representing ideas identified by the Forum e.g. cycle

paths, Greenheart Centre, allotments, as well as having an opportunity to record their own ideas with the 'other' category. Participants indicated which ideas they wanted to see and in which of the twelve green areas they felt the idea should take place using a sticker.

The results can be found below, along with the number of votes received for the image across all wards.

Question 4b findings

The most popular improvement to Abram's green spaces across all areas was through green gyms. This was the top ranked image in every area. It is worth noting that 50% of the votes for this image came from Bamfurlong, which inflates the perceived popularity of Green Gyms overall.

Children's play spaces rank very highly, linking with the reoccurring theme of needing more for young people in the Economy activity. Cycle ways, wildflower meadows, picnic areas and improved public footpaths all scored over 20 votes. During discussion, footpaths and the varied quality was noted frequently, and many people felt strongly that these could be improved.

Many of the larger projects did not receive as much support; football / sports pitches, multi-functional parks and allotments were amongst the lower scoring images.

The Greenheart Centre received modest support. This could be due to a lack of immediate understanding about what the aspiration for such a centre may be. With further work, this may gain support. There were several comments about security / vandalisation of such a building which appeared to make many wary of the idea.

Through conversations it became apparent that each village had a different focus when discussing what could be done to improve their currently used green spaces.

- Amberswood Common and Victoria Fields both received over 70 votes for a range of new interventions. Green Gyms, play space, cycleways and picnic areas were the top four priorities for Amberswood, with Victoria Fields seeing Green Gyms, play space, community allotments and picnic areas as priorities
- Low Hall Park and Virador Woods scored highly for investment, with over 40 votes for different interventions. Green Gyms, play spaces, footpaths / walking trails were popular in these areas
- Ince Moss, the Former Bickershaw Colliery, East of Abram and West of Platt Bridge saw some interest, with between 20 and 30 votes each. On these, Green Gyms were the top priority, with a diverse mix of other images as important
- Less than 20 votes were received for any activity in Hey Brook South, Hey Brook West, East of Platt Bridge or Maypole Woods.

Other comments

Participants could add their own comments about other ideas to improve the greenspaces. These have been grouped under the following themes:

Safety:

- Stopping quad bikes making area unusable for kids and can't catch those on bikes
- Motorbikes ruined fields
- Improve or introduce lighting in green spaces in Platt
 Bridge may increase winter and evening use. Feels safer

- Wouldn't want anything that could be vandalised. Not fair on community
- Virador and Amberswood safety issues
- Amberswood is overgrown and feels unsafe
- Lollipop person needed by schools why did council stop maintaining areas?
- Lily Lane pelican crossings needed have been asked for but council already say traffic is not heavy enough
- Gated areas in Bamfurlong to make it more secure
- Police station isn't used as a proper police station

Improved community links

- Improved links and relationships with Amberswood.

 Developing community relationships
- Improved links with and relationship with Ambers Wood Developing community relationships
- Develop volunteer networks and use what's existing. E.g. Youth offenders to maintain green spaces
- People in other areas don't know Bamfurlong exists invisible!

Communication of assets

- Show green spaces people aren't aware of, or are accessible
- Better advertising and aware of what exists
- Visitor centre perhaps by Polly's pond needs to be visible and accessible
- Better advertising and aware of what exists

Maintenance / cleaner

- Fencing around LA housing is a disgrace. Bring fence
- Bickershaw council has done well in improving area
- Polly's pond needs to be better kept
- People not collecting dog foul

Footpaths / access

- Polly's pond (Kinds Down park?) Park footpaths on half of site
- Ince Moss needs better access for fishing

Other

- Secure dog walking field in Abram, Maypole Wood area (9 Votes)
- Sheltered bus stops and seating
- Don't lose green spaces in Platt Bridge
- Traffic pollution to be considered in all areas.

Summary

Generally, across all five events, there was an enthusiasm to see growth and change to the Abram ward through many avenues, including business ventures and hubs as well as improve green spaces. The following provides a summary of key findings:

Housing

Some residents showed an interest in new homes. Whilst the most popular type of housing was that suitable for families with children, some participants felt that this would need to be supported by improved community facilities such as shops, larger community hubs with activities for a range of ages, and better access to and in the green spaces.

Many participants opposed the loss of green spaces for housing; comments focused on the importance of maintaining good quality, accessible green spaces, both for community members and for increasing tourism, along with keeping the general attractiveness / character of the area. Similarly, residents were concerned about the increasing congestion and traffic, highlighted by residents in Bickershaw, Abram and Bamfurlong.

Economy

Community cafes, seasonal markets, community hubs, pop-up shops, entertainment and skills / training were top priorities. Many felt that the spaces which do exist are currently under used, or would benefit from physical growth to enable community leaders to do more.

Residents commented that existing Community Centres, particularly at Abram and Bickershaw, are invaluable to the areas. Increasing awareness of what is available and accessible to the residents, along with providing varied events, including live events, which target a diverse audience would see these facilities continuing to grow in significance.

Greenspaces

There were some participants who relayed feelings of neglect and a lack of safety across green spaces, particularly Virador Woods and Amberswood Common, which people feel are overgrown and unsafe. Residents in Bamfurlong made comments that they feel the village – "always gets left behind" and that they are "invisible", to the other villages.

An increase in safe and secure children's play areas was considered a key priority across all areas. Comments at all sessions noted that existing provision is not always maintained, dirty and in some cases dangerous.

Exercise and sports facilities were also highly recommended as improvements for the green spaces, particularly green gyms, more cycle paths connecting all the villages, healthy walking trails and footpaths. Many residents felt these would be attractive to people of all ages.

Another suggestion from several participants was to improve or introduce lighting into green spaces, mainly in Platt Bridge, which they believe may increase winter and evening use of facilities.

General

There was for many a focus on their local village. Participants often were not aware of the assets available in the next village, and there was no sense of the overarching asset offered by the greenspace.

Most residents wanted to have better information sharing across the villages, and for community members to interact with other residents. This supports one of the main objectives of the Communities Together Neighbourhood Plan to generate a strong sense of togetherness across the Abram ward - encouraging inter-village activity, inclusivity and investment.

The perception of safety across the Ward needs additional consideration; green space was a key concern, but many discussions also highlighted wider concerns over safety.

Significant work was undertaken by the group to promote the events, and they were held in different locations at a range of times. Despite this, the number of people engaged was lower than hoped. However, the in-depth discussion provided significant information. Many ideas with scope for development came from the sessions, and the feedback supports much of the objectives of the plan. Through the promotion undertaken for the events, a general increase in awareness is likely to have been achieved. Ongoing communication in the lead-up to the referendum is recommended.
